Healthcare Spotlight

Victorian Paediatric Rehabilitation Service, Royal Children's Hospital

The MAD Foundation's enduring partnership with the Victorian Paediatric Rehabilitation Service (VPRS) at the Royal Children's Hospital continues to make a measurable impact for families facing complex challenges.

Led by Dr Neil Wimalasundera and Dr Susie Gibb, the VPRS team cares for children with a wide range of disabilities—from conditions present at birth to injuries and illnesses acquired during the critical years of child development. "These challenges affect not only the child, but their whole family," said Dr Wimalasundera at the recent MAD at the Museum event. "Our goal is always to get children home from hospital and support them to thrive in the community—especially to return to the things they enjoy, like school."

While government systems such as the NDIS exist, gaps remain—especially when needs fall outside eligibility criteria or when timely responses are critical. In these moments, MAD provides practical and responsive support, working in close partnership with clinicians.

"Our patients have high equipment needs that can change rapidly," adds Dr Gibb. "MAD is a very special organisation helping children whose needs cannot wait."

Together, MAD and the VPRS team work to ensure families receive timely, practical support that makes a genuine difference in their daily lives.





This year marks a significant milestone for the MAD Foundation — 25 years of Making a Difference.

It all began on Melbourne Cup Eve in 2001, when a group of friends and supporters came together at our first ever MAD Ball, held at the Plaza Ballroom, Regent Theatre in Melbourne. Tickets were \$110—a considerable sum for many at that stage of life—yet the room was full. That night raised \$35,000 and, more importantly, lit the spark that would drive MAD's mission for the next quarter of a century.

A lot has changed since those early days. Our reach and network of support has expanded, our systems have matured, and the scale of our impact has grown significantly. But the core of MAD remains unchanged: a community of likeminded individuals who find purpose in helping others—not for recognition, but because it truly matters. That enduring spirit continues to define the MAD Foundation.

Over 25 years, the MAD Foundation has directly supported over 400 families and raised more than \$3.4 million to fund equipment, services, and assistance for children and young people living with disability and facing significant hardship. Just as importantly, those families have known they weren't alone—that someone had their back with no strings attached.

Our work is sustained by an extraordinary group of volunteers. Over the years, 62 individuals have served on the MAD Ball organising committee, each contributing their time, skills, and passion on a pro-bono basis. Our volunteer model is at the core of MAD's identity and remains a unique strength.

In 2016, we unveiled a refreshed logo—a visual representation of MAD's values and purpose. It is worth reflecting on what it stands for:

- The two arms in the M symbolise a welcoming outreach.
- The hand within the A is more than a gesture of assistance—it reflects our belief

in connection and inclusion. It speaks to MAD's guiding purpose: *Inspire*, *Connect*, *Make a Difference*.

 The hand forming the D represents the act of putting your hand up to help. It reminds us that we are a volunteer-led organisation.

MAD continues to grow. Strategic investments in technology—enhancing efficiency and impact—have been a critical enabler to expand our reach while staying true to our volunteer-led approach.

This past year has been one of record-breaking generosity, with over \$380,000 distributed. At the same time, our primary fundraising activities, including the MAD Ball and associated donations, are around \$100,000 lower than that. This gap is currently funded from reserves and speaks to both the progress MAD has made and the growing need we are called to meet.

The MAD Foundation remains focused on meeting this growing demand. We are committed to reaching more families, strengthening our systems, and ensuring that every dollar entrusted to us delivers real and lasting benefit.

None of this is possible without the generosity of our supporters. Whether you've donated, volunteered, performed, sponsored, or simply turned up—you are part of this story. Thank you for walking alongside us and truly making a difference—and for helping us build what comes next.

Then & Now: Sean Lynch

Sean Lynch's 19th and final surgery at the Royal Children's Hospital took place in 2015. The procedure was part of a long journey of treatment to help manage the effects of cerebral palsy. Following the surgery, doctors recommended a specialised rehabilitation device—a hi-tech Motomed machine—to support Sean's ongoing therapy, mobility, and quality of life. But for Sean's dad Chris, a single parent who had already exhausted the family's finances on medical expenses, the almost \$10,000 cost was out of reach—leaving him totally dejected. A Royal Children's Hospital paediatrician then asked if she could approach MAD on their behalf.

Just 72 hours later, a call came from a medical supplier: "We have a Motomed ready for delivery—paid in full by The MAD Foundation." No delays, no red tape—just practical help when it was needed most. For Sean and Chris, it was an unforgettable and uplifting experience.

Later that year, they met the MAD team and proudly accepted a role as beneficiary ambassadors. Over the past decade, they've spoken at countless MAD events, helping to give insight into life with disability and what a difference the Foundation can make.

Now 27, Sean has recently moved into his own apartment with the support of carers—loving life in his new digs and taking in all that city living has to offer. He remains a cherished part of the MAD family.




